# Dale Kvalheim

## THAI-BOXER

While living in the States, Dale Kvalheim became interested in boxing, but his hometown offered no boxing program for learning or competition. Upon his arrival in Thailand, he noticed that they had Thai-boxing and several Karate programs, and he decided to get into one of them.

While hanging out at the NCO Club, Dale became fairly well acquainted with one of the bartenders, and he mentioned to the bartender that he was interested in learning how to box the way they do here in Thailand.

As a result to this conversation, Dale was introduced to Kayam. Kayam had taught, and coached Thai-boxing before, but at this point in life Kayam was semi-retired. Dale talked to Kayam about boxing, and through constant effort, Dale convinced Kayam to teach him to box.

Kayam came out of retirement, and put Dale on a training schedule. Dale's training involved running three miles in the morning and three miles in the afternoon. After work, Dale would practice in the ring for 15 to 18 rounds. He did this every day to prepare him for his first fight.

Four months after he started practicing, Dale Kvalheim fought his first fight. (August 1973). "I don't remember too much about the fight. The only thing I remember is how strange it seemed when I knocked him out. I got him against the ropes and all of a sudden, he just stared at me and dropped his hands and rested them on the ropes. I just kept hitting him until he finally went down. I was kind of shocked!"

Since Dale's first fight, he has won 12, and lost 8. Of these fights, he lost only one by being knocked out, but he has seven knock outs to his credit.

Dale is a very popular man throughout Thailand. He has fought before crowds numbered up to 10,000 people. Several of his fights have been televised.

Dale was a little nervous with his first televised fight, but his trainer was more nervous than Dale. Twice Dale's trainer dropped the mouth piece which Dale was suppose to use, and the trainer put the mouth piece into Dale's mouth backwards.



Dale won his fight in spite of the mouth piece problem, but what he won most, was the respect of the Thai people. When on T.V., the Thai people referred to Dale Kvalheim as the "ferocious lion from Udorn".

Dale is considered a professional Thai-boxer, because Thailand doesn't have an amateur association. He does get paid for fighting, but most of the money he earns is used to cover his expenses.

When Dale returns to "the world" he plans to introduce Thai-boxing, ---he would even like to start a school for boxing.

1SG Stanton will accompany SP4 Berk and will serve as a board member, representing the 7th RR&S.

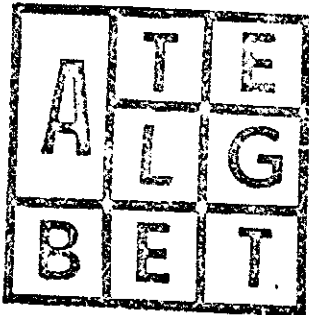
### SOLDIER OF THE MONTH

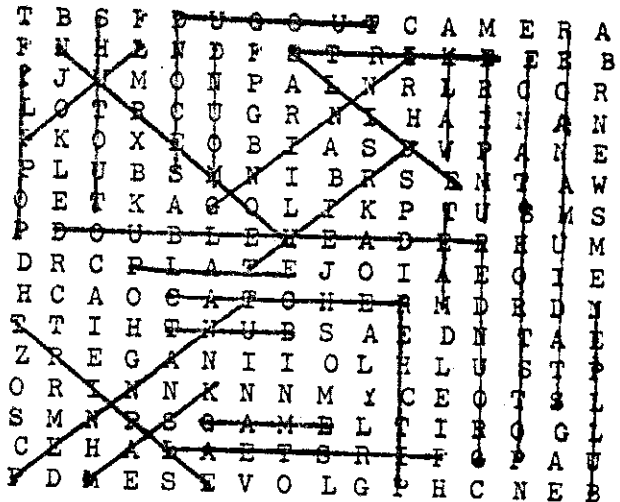

With thirty seconds remaining, UPO scored to take the lead, and then with tenacious defense closed off the MMN scoring attack.

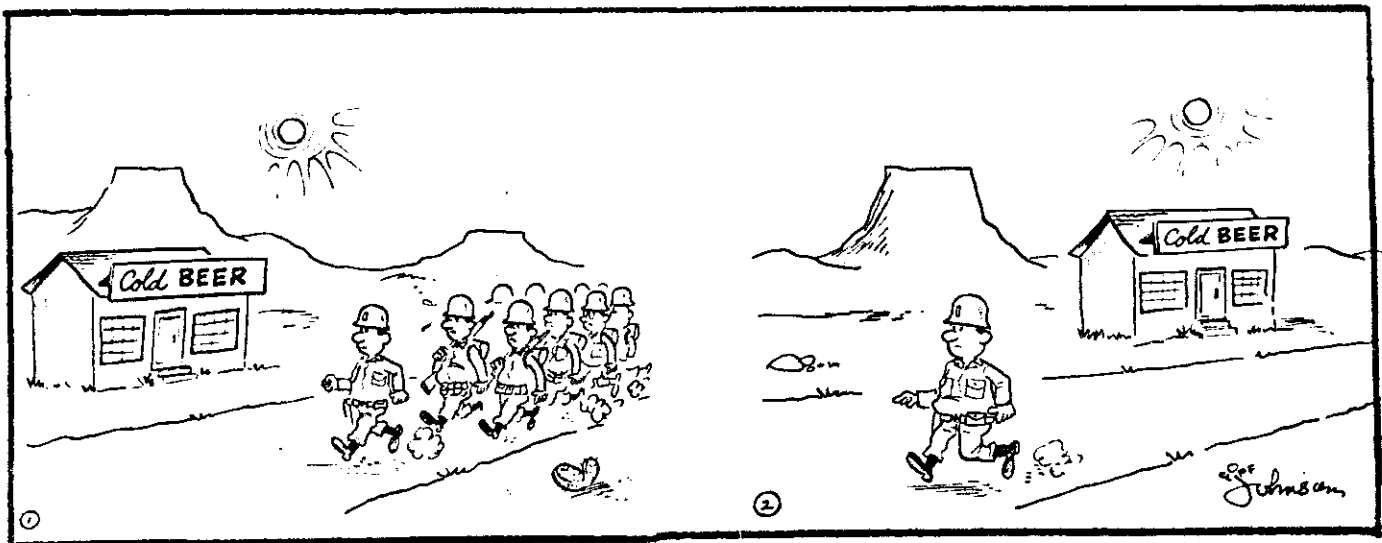


# Flag Football to Start

ANS. I don't know, but worrying about the cure for V.D. is like jumping into a swimming pool without checking, to see if it's been filled first.

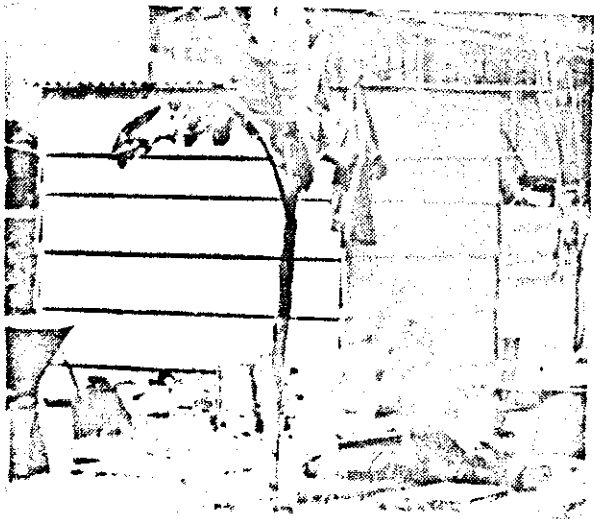
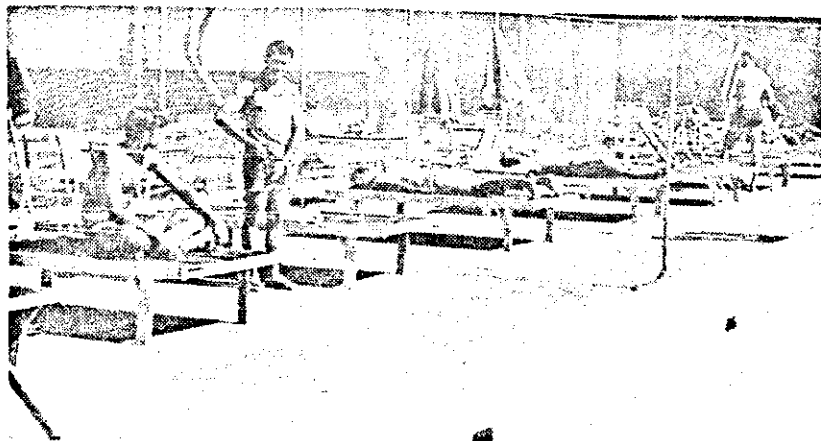
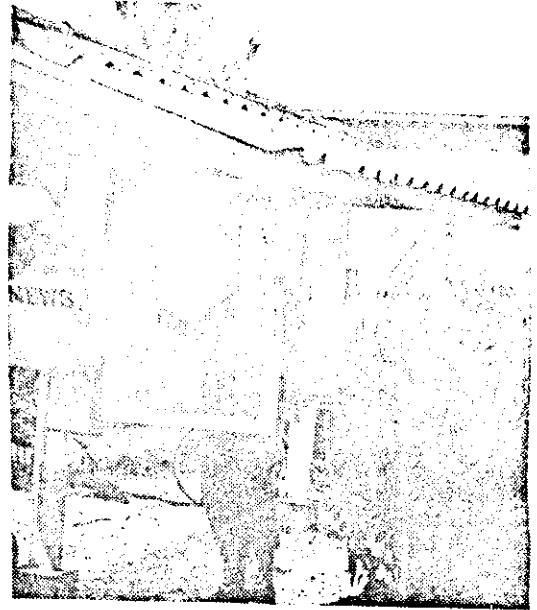
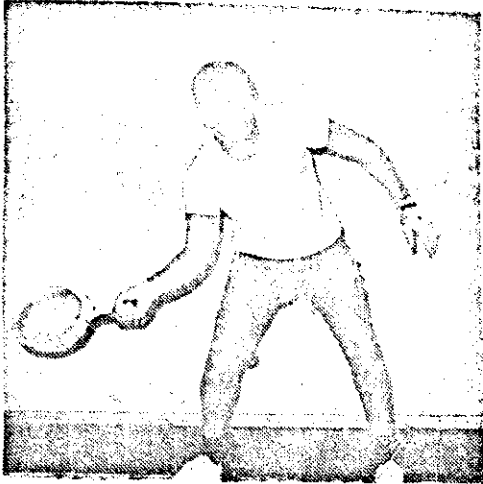

## Drug Quiz Answers

1. (D) If you got this question wrong, go back to the last two issues of the Kobra-7 and look at the two drug quizzes previous to this one. For a Heroin OD, professional medical attention is critical. The greatest immediate danger is respiratory arrest, so the victim needs constant attention to insure he doesn't stop breathing. Street drugs, such as amphetamines, only complicates the job of the doctor. If you ever find an OD try to give him constant attention, never leaving him if possible, and call for a friend to get medical assistance and call for an ambulance. While waiting, try to identify the drug that caused the OD. Don't panic--forget about the bust and save the man's life.

2. (D) Nalkan is completely new drug used by doctors. It completely negates the effects of any opiate drug within five minutes. It has no side effects. Thus the doctor can administer Nalkan to an OD; if he isn't normal in five minutes, the doctor can then treat for barbiturate overdose.

3. (C) Real cocaine is not only expensive, but relatively rare in

Thailand. Smack and speed are common in Thailand. If somebody gives you something for free, he probably expects you to be buying from him before too long. You should immediately suspect an addicting drug. If you're looking to buy a drug, don't expect to be told it isn't available. Use your common sense, and beware.

4. (A) Detoxification from barbiturates is most severe and dangerous, even under medical supervision. In many ways downers are the most dangerous "toys" you can play with.

5. (D) Heroin, a derivative of Morphine, is more addictive because it passes more easily through the membrane protecting the brain. Once in the brain, Heroin is hydrolyzed and becomes Morphine. Thus the only difference is that "Heroin goes right to your head." Morphine tends to accumulate in the liver and other organs and has a difficult time getting to the brain. Therefore with Heroin you have a larger accumulation of Morphine in the brain.
